Working with Bright well

Ms Potts, Headteacher at Brightwell cum Sotwell CofE Primary School, describes how Wallingford School got involved with their 'Healthy Body, Healthy Mind Week'.

Brightwell cum Sotwell CofE Primary School certainly started the second half of the Autumn Term on an energetic note by holding a 'Healthy Body, Healthy Mind Week'. The aim of the week was not only to remind the children how important it is to take care of themselves both physically and mentally, but also to give them opportunities to experience things they might not normally get a chance to do - experiences which perhaps pushed them outside of their comfort zones or maybe even helped them to find a hidden talent!

Over the course of the week, we put together an exciting timetable of events for all ages in the school, which included visits from external companies - archery workshops with Robin Hood Arrows; BMX and Scooter workshops with Mike Mullen and Terry Price; and cookery lessons with Roots to Food - but also allowed us to work in collaboration with our friends up at Wallingford School!

The Science department very kindly invited our Year 3 class to spend the afternoon in one of their amazing labs. The children were taught about the human digestive system before donning the safety googles (definitely a highlight for many children!) and being given the opportunity to carry out their own fantastic experiment using very special science equipment. It showed them what was in certain types of food they might eat – a particular favourite was testing the sugar water, which stunned our children when it magically changed through almost every colour of the rainbow once heated!

A little later in the week, we were thrilled to have the Art department, along with some of the Sixth Formers, spend the day with us. They worked on a whole school mindfulness project, with each class contributing to some giant murals that took inspiration from art based on the



local area and our school values - the murals will eventually be hung up around the school. It really was wonderful to see the mixture of age ranges working together and we can't wait to see the final results!

Earlier this term students studying GCSE and A Level German took part in an Oktoberfest Kneipenquiz at Radley College organised by the Oxford German Network. We didn't win this year, but we all enjoyed a German meal in the dining hall and lots of games in the cricket pavilion, including the most confusing game of Kahoot I have ever seen!

We also entered 4 teams of year 9 students into the GCHQ National Languages Challenge in November with one team – Precious Health Vulture (Joseph Rhodes, Eliza Lombos, Edward Wilcox and Thomas Pool) – coming 74th out of more than 500 teams which is a fantastic achievement! Congratulations to all our students who took part.

We were very sorry to have to postpone our German Exchange due to the adverse weather conditions at Munich airport this term, but plans are already underway to reschedule our visit in the spring. We are also looking forward to taking our A Level students to a Literature Masterclass at Oxford University at the start of next term and our annual French exchange to Grenoble at the end of January.

Our Year 10 and 11 GCSE music students visited the Royal Festival Hall for the Brightsparks Music Concert.

They heard the London Philharmonic Orchestra perform a number of pieces from the GCSE set works, and were shown how the composers used repeated rhythms and leitmotifs to create their pieces. The music was analysed and the orchestra played small sections of each piece, so they could understand how the musical elements were used.

In Music GCSE there is a Listening Paper where students have to answer questions on music from the areas of study, and demonstrate they have an understanding of music terminology. But one of the areas students struggle with is recognising orchestral instruments and how they are played. Indeed some of our students will not have seen a live orchestra, so this concert was an amazing opportunity.

Livery Academy Awards Heat

During Term 1, 33 Year 12 students attended a workshop from a representative from the Speakers' Trust. This was the first stage of the Merchant Taylor's Livery Academy Award, a competition across the Merchant Taylor Schools where students design a product and compete in a 'Dragons' Den'-style competition. Students participated in a number of activities, concluding with them inventing products/business models and pitching these in groups. One group of six was selected to represent the school.



On Monday 4th December, the Wallingford team presented their final design, "The Compose Collective", at The Merchant Taylors' Hall in London. The team of 6 have been working on their design and pitch during terms 1 & 2 and were excited to finally share it with the panel of judges and audience members.

Despite not coming away with a win, the team were bright, poised, eloquent and presented with great accuracy and knowledge of their product.



Team member Bethan said, "Although it was disappointing not winning, I think we've learned so many invaluable skills through the experience as well as bonding as a team, it's been lovely! We had such an enlightening trip to London learning about the Merchant Taylors and getting to meet so many interesting people!"

Why I Love Science

Before half term, Miss Sutton helped run a science essay writing competition for the STFC Rutherford Appleton Laboratory School Science Prize.

They had over 200 entries from different schools and only 16 finalists were selected. One of our Year 7 students, Isabel, was selected as one of those finalists.

Isabel and her family will attend a celebration event at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory where the finalists will give a 2 minute presentation on why they love science, and then an overall winner will be selected.

Read Isabel's essay below:

I love science but not only that, I also love football! Recently scientists and physios have been doing lots of research into women's football boots. Scientific research



has shown that around 82% of female footballers experience pain while playing and 34% have pain in their heel. The scientists doing this research have discovered that the pain that female players experience is linked with their boots. Until recently, all boots were fitted for male feet. When I have been playing football I have found that my boots sometimes don't feel right for my feet - it feels like my arch is unsupported and the boots I used to wear gave me blisters and rubbed my feet. It might not seem likely but male and female feet are very different for a number of reasons. Firstly, female feet have a higher arch than male feet, so when they wear football boots that are designed for men, it can feel really uncomfortable. Not only that, but the width, metatarsal length, metatarsal joint angle and angle circumference of female feet are all different to those of male feet. Often when you watch Women's Super League teams play you will see that many female players have had to cut holes in the back of their boots or buy insoles to make it more comfortable for their heels.

One of the worst injuries a footballer can get is rupturing the ACL (anterior cruciate ligament), it can be career ruining and takes up to a year to be able to start playing football again. Sports scientists discovered that female players are around 3 times more likely to suffer an ACL injury than male players. 30 elite female players suffered an ACL injury last year, meaning they had to miss the World Cup including my favourite player Beth Mead. A scientific journal called Sports Engineering Journal made a link between boots not fitting



female feet and players getting ACL injuries so having football boots that are properly designed for the anatomy of female feet is really important in reducing the risk of ACL injury.

Fortunately after all of this research and tests, sports brands have used science to make better boots for female players to help them be more comfortable and reduce the risk of injury. Nike put together a team of sports scientists and boot designers and spent two years designing the Luna boot that is just for female feet and aims to make playing more comfortable and reduce the risk of injury. Puma have also created boots specially for female feet, using research into the differences of male and female feet that helps women playing football. This is a huge step up because now women will have comfortable footwear while playing and hopefully less injuries.

I'm really glad that the research and surveys have been done because this will affect our play immensely and we will hopefully be more comfortable playing and more importantly have less injuries. So this is exactly why I love science!
