### Mr Marston recently visited the Henley Royal Regatta for a special event:

"It was a pleasure to attend the Henley Royal Regatta as a guest of the 1974 Wallingford Schools Boat Club crew to mark the 50th anniversary of their triumph in winning the Britannia Challenge Cup. It was a very significant victory and many others followed for the crew at national and international level. Despite the weather, it was a great day and the spirit and collective joy of being, and rowing, together shone through. We look forward to welcoming the crew and coach (and former Wallingford School teacher) Bruce Grainger to the school in the autumn to talk with students about their achievement."

Current Wallingford School student Alice Hull (Year 10) stepped in as cox for the anniversary row-past. Mrs Hull tells us, "Alice enjoyed a slightly more relaxing opportunity to cox a crew down the Henley course, after racing with Wallingford RC on Tuesday and Thursday. There was lots of banter in the Wallingford School boat, and with the crew rowing before them, which included their opposition in the 1974 final. Hearing their stories has definitely given Alice a taste for more Henley racing in years to come."





### Here are further details of the anniversary and event from the club newsletter:

"On 7th July 1974, Wallingford Schools Boat Club won the Britannia Challenge Cup at Henley Royal Regatta. They remain the only junior crew to win this "club" coxed fours event. So dominant were they in the regatta, that they won each round bar one by an "easily" verdict. And as a result, the rowing press speculated whether the WSBC crew would be selected to represent GB at the senior world championships, as well as the junior world's (where they won the bronze).

"On 7th July 2024, 50 years to the day later, the crew of John Wiggins, Simon Wroe, Bill Lang and Roger Brown celebrated the anniversary of this achievement, by taking part in a row-past up the Henley course during the HRR finals' day lunch interval. Their coach, Bruce Grainger, and their cox from 50 years ago, Tim Potter, were in attendance also as were many members of their families, all too young to have been there in 1974. Unfortunately Tim is now too tall to shoe-horn into a racing boat, and so one of Wallingford Rowing Club's current coxes Alice Hull, who herself is at Wallingford School, took charge of them. The current Wallingford School Head, John Marston, was also in attendance as the crew's guest.


"Tragically, both Roger and Simon had lost their wives in the last month, but both were determined to go ahead with the row-past. They both know that their wives were beaming down on them with pride."

The Digital Wellbeing
Conference on the 24th
May was the first event

where we competed in the
Livery Academy Awards in
December of last year.

The premise of this conference was to explore the challenges, but also opportunities, digital



technology presents and to take part in workshops to develop strategies for improving digital wellbeing in our schools.


The first speaker began by discussing the amazing things our devices can do for us; a new use for my phone, I discovered, is the ability to tell when a steak is perfectly cooked! However, we were also reminded that, whilst the assistance and entertainment our devices provide has become an integral part of day-to-day life, it is important to remember they can work against us, and not for us, if we are not careful.

The second talk was sobering, as we heard stories about children and teenagers being coerced and pressured into producing self-generated images. As student leaders, we hope to implement some ideas the speaker gave, such as working with small groups of students and delivering educational sessions to help prevent this exploitation from occurring.

The final talk was given by a clinical psychologist, who encouraged us to reflect on the amount of time we spend on our devices, and informed us about the dangers of 'doom scrolling'. The importance of digital detoxes was emphasised as a way to support our mental health and improve our productivity.

Going forward, the student leaders intend to set up student focus groups to find out what the student view is of the digital landscape and what worries and concerns they have. We will use this information to form part of the groundwork for creating a digital wellbeing charter. We thoroughly enjoyed our day in London and thank the Merchant Taylors' Company for the opportunity to learn more about digital wellbeing.







216 Wallingford School students took part in UKMT maths challenges this year, with plenty of success. The challenges are designed to make students think and use mathematical reasoning in challenging questions. Across the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Mathematical Challenges, our students were awarded 26 gold certificates, 53 silver certificates and 65 bronze certificates. Well done particularly to those students in Years 9, 10 and 11 who came into school on an INSET day to take part.

### **Junior**

Year 7 and 8 students achieved 10 gold, 32 silver and 37 bronze certificates. Benjamin Capo-Bianco, Sam Baker, Daniele Massera, Keizo Somarakis, Caleb Southam, Thomas Carberry, George Ramsay and Jack Johansen got through to the Junior Kangaroo.

### **Intermediate**

Year 9, 10 and 11 students achieved 11 gold, 10 silver and 12 bronze certificates. Raihan Horvat, Joseph Rhodes, Grace Smyth, Jessica Clayton, Joshua Skeels, Celyn Marriot, Matthew Hindle, Rohan Clark and Nazar Mykhailenko qualifying for the Pink and Grey Kangaroos. Callum Reynolds and Charles Mortimer qualified for the Olympiads.

### **Senior**

Year 12 and 13 students achieved 5 gold, 11 silver and 16 bronze certificates. Douglas Watt, Shona Cummings, Genevieve Bispham, Owen Hill, Matthew Lewis and Thomas Hindle made it through to the Senior Kangaroo.



# Mathematical Olympiad for girls

Six year 13s took part in the Mathematical Olympiad for Girls – a difficult 2.5 hour challenge. They were very successful with 2 certificates of distinction and 2 certificates of merit. Shona Cummings and Lola Gunn were invited to apply for Jane Street's WiSE programme for those who scored highly.



### **Team**

This year also saw the return of the Team Maths Challenge for the first time since Covid. Four students from years 8 and 9 went to Headington School to participate in 4 rounds of mathematical challenges against other schools. The team did very well and, against stiff competition, came 5th out of 17 schools. Well done to Callum Reynolds, Joseph Rhodes, Tilda Santer and Syrah Delabie. We look forward to continuing to take teams in the future.

### Rotary Club 'Student of the Term'

Over the past couple of terms, Mr Lyons has been asked to nominate a student for the Rotary Club 'Student of the Term' award, which celebrates a student for their fundraising efforts.

Last term, Will Hamilton, Year 13, was awarded for his Royal British Legion fundraising, which took him on a journey from a 104km run over the Remembrance '23 weekend to the London Marathon!

This term, we hand the award over to Oliver Nathanielsz, Year 9, who describes the 'challenge' section of his Duke of Edinburgh Award as inspiration for his fundraising effort for the National Autistic Society.

Oliver attended the Rotary Club award ceremony in June and said, "It was an amazing experience meeting everyone at the Rotary Club – they were so welcoming and friendly. We met some really interesting people and they all made me feel at ease when I read out my speech."

Many congratulations Oliver – we are incredibly proud!

### Here's an excerpt from Oliver's speech:

In September 2023, Wallingford School offered the opportunity of completing the Duke of Edinburgh bronze award. I knew this was something I really wanted to participate in. For those of you unfamiliar with the Duke of Edinburgh award, each attendee must complete three elements - a challenge, a physical activity and volunteering.

I decided to use my love of cricket for physical activity, as I am a regular player for the under 15s and the adult team in Cholsey, along with my dad who is also part of the club. My sister Thea plays football for Cholsey Bluebirds, so I volunteered to help with her training every week along with refereeing her games as and when required.

However, the 'challenge' was something I had to really think about. The results of this challenge are what my teacher, Mr Lyons, nominated me for. I decided to train and run the Cholsey Treehouse 10K. As I was under 16, I had to get my dad to run with me, along with my Uncle Joe and Uncle Matt who decided to show their support. As the four of us were going to run, I asked if we could fundraise for the 'National Autistic Society'. This is because my 5 year old Cousin Noah is autistic; Noah is loving and affectionate, and one of the happiest children you could ever meet - if we were all a little bit like Noah, the world would be a much better place.

My Uncle Matt and Auntie Sophie, Noah's parents, rely on the National Autistic Society for so much, whether it's online webinars, watching videos, attending speech & language therapy or learning Makaton signing, so the cause is something that is very close to our hearts.

The training was hard and I used the Macmillan "Couch to 10k" to help. However, in December I had to have emergency lower abdominal surgery, which meant that I could not train for 6 weeks, and it was only three months before my run! As soon as my recovery was done, I was straight back in my running shoes!

It took a while to get back into the swing of things, but as soon as I was fully recovered, I was back into running 5ks, which went from 7 to 9 to 10k in as little as 2 months.

And then, just like that, it was the day of the run - March 24th! I was excited, but scared about how I would do. However, as soon as I met up with my dad and uncles who were doing the run with me, and other family members cheering us on throughout the race, I believed in myself and I completed the run in 1 hour and 8 minutes!



Our initial fundraising target on the Just Giving page was £1,000 and we reached this within 24 hours! And then, after the run, we were at £2,500! I was so surprised, yet I knew there were a lot of people who donated and I am still grateful to this day for all the support.

I had a lot of fun during my experience, although there were some ups and some downs. We finished the fundraising with a final count of £3,020, which is amazing especially as the original target was £1,000! My Uncle Matthew ran the London Marathon in 2022 for the same cause and he raised £3,031. So, as a family it is amazing that we have raised in excess of £6,000 for this amazing cause.












# Year 8 Caen Trip







### An extraordinary destiny unfolds...




But there are rumours of a growing dark force . . . and students who fail the trials are disappearing. Can Zhi Ging uncover the truth before it's too late?
