Livery Academy Awards Heat Win

At the start of the school year, six students were selected to take part in the prestigious Merchant Taylors' Livery Academy Awards. This competition, designed to nurture entrepreneurial and presentation skills among Sixth Form students, also aims to strengthen connections between Livery Company members and their associated state schools. The challenge was to pitch a product to investors, with the goal of raising up to £2,000,000.



The brief was that the product or business would:

- Promote or provide a benefit to their local community.
- Use new technology or find different ways of using existing technology.
- Either be entirely new or add an extra dimension to something that already exists.

Since September, our Wallingford team worked tirelessly to perfect our presentation. With the invaluable support of Ms. McGowan and our mentors, we honed our pitch over countless lunchtimes and after-school sessions. When the big day arrived, we travelled to Merchant Taylors' Hall in London to present our product.

The competition was fierce, with impressive presentations from all the schools involved: Foyle College, Northern Ireland; the all-girls St Saviour's & St Olave's School, London;



and Aylesbury UTC (our Trust partner). As the last team to present, our anticipation and nervousness grew steadily. However, as we took to the stage, our nerves turned into a surge of adrenaline. We delivered our best performance yet - far surpassing any of our practice runs. The Q&A session went just as smoothly, and the feedback we received was encouraging.

We also had the pleasure of meeting



the guest head judge Evan Davis, a man renowned for his work as a broadcaster, and host of Dragon's Den and Newsnight, whose insights and expertise added remarkable excitement to the day!

When the moment of truth arrived, we were crowned winners of the heats! It was a thrilling achievement and a testament to all our hard work. Now, we set our sights on the next challenge: presenting once again in January at the grand Mansion House, this time competing against teams from Drapers, Grocers and Haberdashers' Livery Companies.

The Merry Wanderers Project

As part of their transition to Wallingford School the whole of Year 7 took on the challenge of performing the Shakespeare play, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. In just over two months the Year 7s learnt and rehearsed key scenes from the play culminating in a performance in front of a huge audience. The process started with Tom from Bright Torches running workshops with each form group, helping them get to grips with speaking in Shakespearean English and inspiring the year group with acting games. From there each form group was assigned a scene and they tirelessly rehearsed and impressively learnt lines. The final performance was a real triumph – the students did fantastically well and should be enormously proud of their achievement.

Here are the words of Kaylee, Amelia and Rosie about their experience with the project:

"The rehearsals were fun, amusing and spectacular. Once our roles were chosen we went straight into practising the scene. Every time we practised, we did it on the stage so we got a feel for what it was going to be like when we performed it. When we didn't really know what we were doing it was hard, but when we did it all came together.

"The performance was nerve-wracking but exhilarating! Behind the stage we were all buzzing with excitement, some of us were a little anxious and didn't want to go on, but when we were out there nothing could stop us from doing an AMAZING PERFORMANCE! It was great!"

(lucky people).

We also have an event called Choko, where I have the pleasure of having my own DJ set for about 40 minutes. The festival gets more and more people every year. This year, along with my set, I had a lot to do with the lighting. When you have a festival, many of the lights require a lot of movement and some of them didn't like being moved on their own, so I was doing a lot by hand!

This year on my birthday, I did the sound for our village panto, Cinderella. I started in September and thought, "Okay, this will be good." What I didn't realise was how much work it would be for me! Yet, even while listening to an annoying song on repeat, it is still really fun!

In school, I have been very busy. If I get a chance to get out the lighting equipment, I am there and I am happy to do anything. I often get asked to do events for different members of staff such as open evening. I had some of my own equipment around the school to make the school a bit brighter as the nights where drawing in. I am very committed with the things I do at school with lights or sound. I have been fitting our hired-in lighting ready for the Christmas Concert and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, which will look amazing with our new lights.

I started getting into this when I was 8 years old and there were many people who have helped me through that, and now I have started doing events for myself like discos and village events. In the future I hope to have my own self-employed business where people hire me to do events like parties, weddings and outdoor festivals.

It has been another busy start to the year for the Languages department.

We were very happy to hold another Speed Language Learning event to celebrate European Day of Languages in September. This year we had a fantastic array of languages on offer – Cantonese, Dutch, Maltese, Ukrainian, Polish, Korean, Italian, Mandarin, Spanish, Welsh, Russian, Japanese and Finnish. Eunice in 7ELO won the prize for the most popular language (Cantonese) as voted for by the language learners who attended the event. Thank you to everyone that took part!

Our GCSE and A Level German students took part once again in an Oktoberfest Kneipenquiz at Radley College organised by the Oxford German Network. They ate a German-themed meal and competed against German students from other local schools in a German pub quiz.







We also entered 4 teams into the GCHQ National Languages Challenge in November for the third year running. One of our teams – made up of Colin W, Caleb S, Syrah D and Danica S - came 108th out of more than 2000 teams which is a fantastic achievement! Very well done to them and all the teams. They will receive their certificates for this in Year 9 assembly shortly.

As I write we are putting together the final details of our annual German Exchange to

We are also looking forward to taking our A Level French and German students to a Literature Masterclass at Oxford University at the start of next term and our annual French Exchange to Grenoble at the start of February. Earlier this term, I was lucky enough to win a place on a teacher training course for German teachers from the UK in Berlin, which was run by the Goethe Institut and funded by the Department for Education. I set off for Berlin on a Sunday morning in November and I don't think the sun came out from behind the clouds the whole time I was in Berlin, but this did not stop me from having a fantastic time!

The group I met up with in Berlin was made up of 15 German teachers from a range of state schools across the UK; there was even a teacher from Orkney! We spent all day both working on our German language skills and planning lesson sequences in small groups. We also visited a German school outside of Berlin and observed some English lessons. This experience provoked some really interesting (and sometimes heated!) discussions in German about teaching styles and approaches. Our



German hosts were adamant that there are too many rules in schools in the UK, whereas my British colleagues and I felt that a more rigorous approach to behaviour leads to better student outcomes!

In the evenings we were able to explore Berlin and we took the opportunity to visit as many of the incredible historic sights the city has to offer as possible. The last time I had been



in Berlin was for my 21st birthday in 1999 and the city has changed so much since then. A particular highlight for me was a visit to the Tränenpalast which was used as a departure hall at Freidrichsstraße station for passengers crossing from East to West Berlin. There were many tearful goodbyes in the building hence its name "Palace of Tears". I was 11 when the Berlin Wall came down and I still remember my mum crying in front of the news on the TV saying "I never thought this would ever happen". I've been really interested in this period of German history ever since and it was incredible to visit key sites which played such a pivotal role in the Cold War, such as Checkpoint Charlie and Bernauer Straße.



All in all, this was an incredible opportunity and one

that I won't forget in a hurry. It was amazing to be in Berlin, working on my German, but also a real privilege to spend so much time discussing teaching and learning with such a dedicated and experienced group of teachers. I came home with a suitcase full of Lebkuchen and a head full of ideas for the Languages department!

Xear 10 Textiles: Inspired By Nature



This year, for our Year 10 Textiles trip we went to visit the Oxford Botanic Garden. The purpose of the trip was so that we could explore lots of different plants and flowers and draw them using different pens and pencils onto varied materials, such as card, coloured paper and even tracing paper. We also took lots of photos so that we could use them in future work, as our theme for Textiles this year is "Inspired by Nature".

We saw lots of unique plants and flowers which aren't usually seen in our everyday life. Some of the plants were amazing to look at: leaves with lots of different patterns, leaves with pink sections, we were even able to go into a little indoor rainforest to draw rainforest plants, which was a great opportunity. There were also lots of new flowers to discover that were amazing to analyse.

We started off exploring part of the garden with the whole class, so we could all sit and attempt to sketch some of the same plants. Then we were given free time so that we could explore the rest of the gardens, drawing and taking photos of those plants which took our interest.

The trip was so much fun as there were so many new, exciting plants that we were able to sit down and investigate. With all the photos we took we were able to attempt new features on the computer: thumbnail prints, negative photo changes and colour change photos. We created a trip report in our sketch book where we included all the beautiful drawings.

It was such a fun day out and I would highly recommend anyone interested in nature to go and visit the Oxford Botanic Garden to see all of the unique and incredible wildlife they have to offer.

This year for our topic on "Inspired by Nature", our Textiles class visited Oxford Botanic Garden, to explore the different plants and flowers and draw them for our project. This trip gave us a chance to discover many growing plants we hadn't seen before.

We went round the different parts of the garden, took photographs and compared our favourite flowers! Our group experimented with different materials and paper to recreate the plants in front of us. We used pens, pencils, coloured pens and different coloured paper to see which ones looked best. There were many different shapes and patterns on the plants that we drew in detail.

After a little while we looked into the greenhouse area where many more exciting plants grew, including bananas, colourful flowers and more exotic greenery. This is where we took our time to produce even more sketches of bigger, more detailed plants. This was an amazing opportunity to draw even more unique greenery. Later we took our time to recreate the flowers in the lower gardens, sketching them carefully in a lot of detail, zooming in to the interesting colours.

This really helped with our final projects we are creating. When we got back to the classroom, we experimented with something called negative and colour change photos, to test how the filters altered the vibrant colours of the original photos we had taken. We then mounted up our photos and drawings onto a page in our sketchbooks to show how our trip went and what we had done!

This trip to the gardens had really helped us with what we were designing and the topic we are covering currently. We got to experience all the unique and wonderful plants there were in the gardens!

During this concert Miss Lovett premiered her KS3 choir with over 40 students squeezing onto the stage. Special shout-out to the lighting and sound teams (all run by students) who did a fantastic job.



The day after, Ms Hammond took our A level musicians to Wells Cathedral School for an A level Study Day on 'An introduction to the 'isms". We had an amazing talk from Gavin Plumley, a lecturer specialising in music and culture of Central Europe. He spoke about The Second Viennese School and focussed on Schoenberg and his music. There was a chance to play instruments in the amazing facilities of the school, where Dr Jonathan James, a specialist in collaborative improvisation, had students improving in orchestral sections and then all 120+ students performed together. At the end of the day, one of the school's orchestras performed Stravinsky's Pulcinella Suite with Simon Lloyd analysing the music through the performance. We also heard them perform two other set composers, Schoenberg's *Notturno for Strings and Harp* and the Sixth Form female Choralia singing Lili Boulanger's *Les Sirènes*.

It was a wonderful experience to not only attend a specialist music school with amazing facilities (we counted 6 Steinway grand pianos just in the rooms we went into!), students also enjoyed talking to those who attend the school, and the experience of hearing and seeing live music can never be underestimated.

Henry and Noah said, "It was fascinating and we especially enjoyed the improvising session!" while Ed said, "I enjoyed the Schoenberg talk, it will help me in the Serialism part of the paper."

We would like to say a huge thank you to the hospitality of Wells Cathedral School for making us feel so welcome and for a fabulous and very useful day.
